


#### Introduction

  - Labor market returns to a GED
  - Measuring the national high school graduation rate

#### DATA

#### 2008 American Community Survey

- Collected by the U.S. Census Bureau
- Mail-in, mail back survey



#### STRENGTHS OF THE DATA

- Includes the entire resident population, including the institutionalized population & the armed forces, important for measuring attainment of minority males
- Measurement of spoken English language ability
- Very large sample sizes


#### WEAKNESSES OF THE DATA

- Inferring GED receipt from the highest education attained question:
- "What is the highest degree or level of school this person has completed?"
- so persons who obtained a GED and went on to complete some college credit or postsecondary degree can not be identified as GED completers, underestimating GED receipt and not illuminating one important benefit of the GED




### THE PREVALENCE OF THE GED


# Distribution of Educational Attainment of Hispanic Adults Age 20 and Older -- 2008





### Mean Earnings of Full-time, Full-year Hispanic Workers --2008




### MULTIVARIATE RESULTS

- Dependent variable: Log Annual Earnings
- Sample: Full-time, Full-year Hispanic workers age 20-to-64

- Regressors:
- Potential Labor Market Experience
- English Language Ability
- For foreign-born: years since migration
- Geographic controls: South Census region and metropolitan status
- Hispanic origin subgroup

# Estimated Earnings Premium for Hispanic Workers – 2008

(uncredentialled high school dropout is the omitted reference group)



#### Limitations of the Analysis:

GED as a spur to postsecondary education not illuminated

 Unable to control for completed years of school for GED recipients

No measure of cognitive ability
